







By aligning their efforts, they aimed to forge a global alliance that prioritizes gender equality in every sphere, from local governance to international development.










Amna Munawwar Awan- President of the Centre of Pakistan and **International Relations (COPAIR)**

Ms. Amna Munawwar Awan, President of the Centre of Pakistan and International Relations (COPAIR), opened the EmpowerHER event with a powerful welcome speech that set an ambitious and visionary tone for the day. As the event's host and a passionate advocate for gender equality, Ms. Awan addressed the critical need for gender parity, framing it not as a goal but as a fundamental human right central to sustainable development. Her speech emphasized that achieving gender equality is no longer just a matter of advocacy—it is a matter of urgency for building a just, inclusive, and prosperous society.

In her remarks, Ms. Awan reflected on the significant global momentum for women's empowerment, underscoring the positive strides made in recent years to address gender disparities. However, she also acknowledged that much more needs to be done to ensure that women, especially in marginalized and underserved communities, have equal access to opportunities, resources, and decision-making spaces.

Through this initiative, COPAIR seeks to uplift women across Pakistan and beyond, enabling them to participate fully in the global digital economy and take on leadership roles in technology and innovation.

Dilsad Senol -Ambassador of the Office of Representative of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus

As a distinguished guest speaker, Dilsad Senol, Ambassador of the Office of the Representative of the Turkish Republic of Northern Cyprus (TRNC), delivered a compelling address that captivated the audience with her insights on Public Diplomacy and Gender Equality. With a wealth of experience in diplomatic relations and a deep commitment to advancing gender equity, Ambassador Senol brought a unique perspective to the EmpowerHER roundtable, highlighting the critical intersections of diplomacy, gender rights, and empowerment.



Ambassador Senol began her speech by emphasizing the importance of international cooperation in addressing genderbased disparities. She noted that while progress has been made in many regions, the global gender equality movement must continue to be reinforced through consistent action and collective will. Her remarks centered on the role of diplomacy and foreign policy in shaping global narratives about women's rights and the fundamental necessity of empowering women in all sectors of society.





She argued that governments, institutions, and leaders must leverage diplomatic platforms to advocate for policies that foster gender equality, both locally and internationally.

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Ambassador Senol also highlighted how gender equality is not just an issue for women but for all of humanity. She stressed that when women are empowered, society as a whole benefits -economically, socially, and politically. Daniela Draugelis - Founder of Cultural Pathways LLC

Daniela Draugelis, Founder of Cultural Pathways LLC, delivered an impassioned and thought-provoking speech on the theme "Women's Rights are Human Rights." In her address, she emphasized that the rights of women are not separate or secondary to human rights, but are an inherent and integral part of the universal human rights framework.







Drawing from her vast experience in the field of human rights and global advocacy, Daniela framed the conversation around the fundamental principle that gender equality is not a privilege but a basic human right that must be recognized and upheld by all societies, governments, and institutions.

Daniela began her speech by acknowledging the historical and contemporary struggles that women face around the world, particularly those living in marginalized communities where their rights are systematically denied. She reminded the audience that women's rights violations—ranging from genderbased violence to unequal access to education, healthcare, and pervasive employment opportunities—are must and be addressed at every level. She underscored that this is not just a "women's issue" but a global human rights issue that requires collective action from all sectors of society.

One of the key points Draugelis raised was the need for a shift in societal mindsets, urging that the world must move beyond the traditional view that women's rights are negotiable or conditional. She emphasized that true gender equality can only be achieved when societies recognize and respect the rights of women in the same way that they recognize and respect the rights of men. This fundamental shift, she argued, requires a cultural transformation where women are seen as equal participants in every aspect of life, from the political arena to the business world, and from the home to the community





Draugelis highlighted several successful global initiatives that have made significant strides in advancing women's rights. She spoke about the role of international organizations, advocacy groups, and grassroots movements in creating change and raising awareness about the importance of women's rights. Drawing attention to the global #MeToo movement, she celebrated how it has sparked conversations about sexual harassment and gender violence, creating a ripple effect of empowerment for women everywhere.

She also mentioned the critical importance of legal frameworks such as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), which provide a blueprint for governments to protect and promote the rights of women and girls.

She urged the international community to unite in ensuring that women are provided with the same opportunities, protections, and rights as men. She emphasized the importance of international cooperation and solidarity in achieving gender equality. Drawing from her experiences working with diverse communities, Daniela shared stories of hope and resilience, illustrating how when women are empowered and provided with equal rights, entire societies thrive. She stressed the undeniable link between the empowerment of women and the overall progress of nations, highlighting how gender equality is directly tied to economic development, social justice, and peacebuilding.





Draugelis also spoke about the importance of education and awareness in advancing women's rights. She called on governments, institutions, and individuals to take proactive steps in educating both men and women about the importance of gender equality and the benefits it brings to society as a whole. She also emphasized the need for continued advocacy and policy reforms that would ensure women's rights are legally protected and implemented.

In her concluding remarks, Daniela Draugelis reminded the audience that women's rights are human rights, and that the fight for gender equality must be at the forefront of global human rights advocacy. She urged all attendees to take personal responsibility in supporting initiatives that promote women's empowerment and to continue challenging the systems that perpetuate gender inequality.

Her speech left a lasting impact on the audience, reinforcing the idea that achieving gender equality is not a distant goal, but a shared responsibility that requires urgent action from individuals, communities, and governments alike. Through her words, Draugelis inspired everyone present to view women's rights through a universal lens—one that acknowledges that true human rights cannot be achieved until women's rights are fully realized.





Cristina Von Sperling Afridi- Founder and Chairperson of the Karim Khan Afridi Welfare Association (KKAWF) Pakistan

Cristina Von Sperling Afridi, the Founder and Chairperson of the Karim Khan Afridi Welfare Association (KKAWF) Pakistan, delivered a compelling and thought-provoking address on the subject of "Empowerment of Young Girls through Training and Mentoring." Her speech was a cornerstone of the session, providing actionable insights and inspiring the audience to envision a future where every young girl has the opportunity to reach her full potential.



Ms. Afridi began by painting a vivid picture of the challenges that young girls in Pakistan face, including limited access to education, social and cultural constraints, and the pervasive issue of gender-based violence. She emphasized the need for a holistic approach to empowerment—one that combines skill-building, emotional education, support. and "Empowerment," she stated, "is not just about education or economic opportunities; it's about enabling girls to make choices that are free from fear and societal pressure."





She delved into the transformative power of training programs tailored specifically for young girls, highlighting their role in building self-confidence, critical thinking skills, and technical expertise. Ms. Afridi shared success stories from KKAWF's initiatives, where girls from underserved communities were provided with life skills training, vocational education, and mentorship.

These programs, she noted, not only improved the girls' career prospects but also had a ripple effect on their families and communities.

Ms. Afridi also explored the critical role of mentorship, describing it as the "bridge" between potential and achievement. She spoke passionately about how mentorship gives young girls the guidance and support they need to overcome obstacles, make informed decisions, and navigate the complexities of a rapidly changing world. She proposed creating a national mentorship framework that connects professional women from various fields with young girls who aspire to break free from traditional roles and stereotypes.

A key aspect of her speech was the intersection of empowerment and mental health. Ms. Afridi highlighted how unresolved mental health issues, often exacerbated by societal pressures, can hinder a young girl's ability to achieve her goals. She stressed the importance of integrating mental health education and support services into training programs, ensuring that girls are equipped to deal with the emotional challenges they face. KKAWF's initiatives, she noted, include counseling and awareness sessions that address issues such as anxiety, stress, and self-esteem.





Ms. Afridi also touched on the importance of creating safe spaces for young girls—environments where they can express themselves freely, learn without fear, and interact with positive role models. She emphasized that these spaces are critical for fostering creativity, collaboration, and leadership skills among girls.

In addition to local challenges, Ms. Afridi linked her message to the global movement for women's empowerment. She pointed out that empowering young girls is not just a moral imperative but also an economic and social necessity.

Studies have shown that countries with higher levels of gender equality tend to experience stronger economic growth and more cohesive societies. "When we empower young girls," she said, "we are laying the foundation for a future that benefits everyone."

Ms. Afridi concluded her speech with a powerful call to action. She urged policymakers, educators, civil society organizations, and private sector leaders to invest in scalable and sustainable training and mentoring programs. She appealed to the audience to act as champions for young girls, breaking down barriers and creating pathways for their success. "Empowering a girl," she stated, "is the first step toward empowering an entire nation."



Her address resonated deeply with the audience, leaving a lasting impact. It underscored the importance of collective action and the need for innovative approaches to empower young girls, ensuring they become confident leaders, changemakers, and equal participants in shaping Pakistan's future.

Taqdees Gillani - Minister for Azad Kashmir Small Industries Corporation

Taqdees Gillani, the Minister for Azad Kashmir Small Industries Corporation, delivered a thought-provoking speech on the critical topic of Women's Political Empowerment in Decision-Making. She emphasized the challenges and opportunities related to empowering women politically, asserting that their active participation in governance is crucial for the development of a just and equitable society. Ms. Gillani underscored the necessity of creating an enabling environment where women can take on leadership roles and influence policy decisions at every level of government.







In her address, Ms. Gillani discussed the significant barriers that women face in entering politics, from societal biases to institutional hurdles. She pointed out that women, particularly in rural and conservative areas, often encounter cultural and political barriers that limit their opportunities for political engagement. These obstacles, she argued, prevent women from contributing their perspectives and ideas to decision-making processes that directly impact their lives and communities.

Ms. Gillani stressed the importance of reforms that would empower women to run for office, participate in legislative processes, and hold key positions in government. She called for greater representation of women in political parties and emphasized the need for political platforms that actively support women's candidacies. For women to effectively contribute to policymaking, she highlighted the importance of providing them with the necessary tools—including education, training, and mentorship—to navigate the political landscape.

She also highlighted the significance of legislative reforms to ensure that women's voices are heard in decision-making processes. Ms. Gillani argued that these reforms should include measures such as quotas for women in elected offices, stronger legal frameworks for the protection of women's political rights, and increased support for women in political campaigns. These changes, she explained, would help dismantle the long-standing political barriers that have traditionally hindered women's active participation in governance.





In addition to policy reforms, Ms. Gillani pointed out that women's political empowerment also depends on changing societal attitudes toward women in leadership roles. She spoke about the need for cultural shifts that promote women as political leaders, role models, and decision-makers. This involves challenging stereotypes and promoting the idea that women are just as capable of holding office and making critical decisions as men.

Ms. Gillani's speech was a powerful call for collective action to ensure women's political empowerment. She concluded by urging all stakeholders—governments, political parties, civil society organizations, and communities—to work together to create an inclusive political environment where women are not only participants but leaders in shaping the policies that affect their lives. Her remarks were a timely reminder that political empowerment is essential for women to realize their full potential and contribute to a society that values equity, justice, and inclusion.









Ms. Saadia Sabir - Program Manager at the United States Institute of Peace

Ms. Saadia Sabir, Program Manager at the United States Institute of Peace (USIP), played a crucial role in facilitating a dynamic and thought-provoking conversation among the distinguished participants. As the moderator of this session, her expertise was key in guiding the dialogue toward actionable solutions and fostering a collaborative atmosphere where voices from diverse sectors—government, civil society, and international organizations—were heard and valued.







She emphasized that women's empowerment is not only a matter of social justice but also a fundamental prerequisite for establishing lasting peace and stability. Her insights encouraged participants to view gender equality as an essential element of any peacebuilding process, stressing that societies can only be truly peaceful when women are fully involved in decision-making and conflict resolution.

Throughout the session, Ms. Sabir guided the conversation towards cross-sector collaboration, urging the need for greater coordination between governmental bodies, civil society organizations, and international agencies to create more inclusive, gender-responsive policies. She facilitated a lively exchange of ideas on how to implement effective strategies for empowering women within peacebuilding frameworks, with a focus on education, economic empowerment, and political participation as key drivers for creating sustainable peace.

One of the key takeaways from Ms. Sabir's session was the understanding that achieving gender equality requires a multi-dimensional approach, where women's voices are included at every level—from grassroots movements to international negotiations. She encouraged the gender influencers in the room to not only advocate for gender equality but also to actively create networks of support and collaboration across borders and sectors.





Ms. Sabir also highlighted the importance of measuring the impact of gender equality initiatives, emphasizing that it is crucial to track and evaluate the outcomes of programs designed to empower women and promote peace. Her approach to the session was solution-oriented, focusing on real-world applications of the discussions and encouraging participants to take concrete steps in their own spheres of influence to drive change.

By the end of the session, there was a shared sense of among the attendees commitment to strengthen connections between gender equality and peacebuilding efforts, ensuring that women continue to play an integral role in creating societies that are not only more equitable but also more peaceful.

Krishna Kumari - Senator at Senate of Pakistan

Senator Krishna Kumari, the first Hindu Thari woman to serve in Pakistan's Senate, delivered the concluding remarks at the event, leaving a lasting impact with her powerful words and inspiring journey. As a trailblazer who overcame numerous obstacles as a woman from a marginalized community, Senator Kumari shared her deeply personal story of perseverance, resilience, and the significant challenges she faced to rise to the highest legislative body of the country. Her address was not just a reflection of her personal achievements, but a call to action for all women to continue pushing for gender equality and political empowerment.







speech, Senator Kumari emphasized the importance of representation in political spheres, especially for from underrepresented and women marginalized communities. She expressed that the absence of women's voices in policy-making and legislative processes perpetuates inequality and fails to address the diverse needs of society. She stressed that increasing women's participation in political leadership is not merely a matter of fairness, but a necessity for shaping policies that truly reflect the values of justice, equity, and inclusivity.

Senator Kumari's own journey from a rural community to the Senate is a testament to the transformative power of political engagement for women, particularly in regions where gender roles and cultural norms often limit women's access to power and decision-making roles.





She shared how her position as a senator has allowed her to advocate for the needs of vulnerable communities, particularly women and minorities, who often remain invisible in the halls of power. She also spoke about the challenges she has faced within the political system, including the systemic barriers that women encounter in politics—such as gender bias, discrimination, and the lack of support networks for women in governance.

As a politician who represents the interests of the marginalized, Senator Kumari highlighted that having women in positions of power is essential for achieving societal transformation. She explained that women bring unique perspectives to the policy-making process that are often rooted in empathy, care, and social justice. By ensuring women's inclusion in political decision-making, not only are gender disparities addressed, but societal issues such as poverty, violence, education, and healthcare are given greater attention and importance.

Senator Kumari also spoke about the need for legal reforms that create a more inclusive political environment for women, emphasizing that policies and laws should be designed to facilitate women's full participation in politics.





This includes measures such as gender quotas, mentorship programs, and capacity-building initiatives that prepare women to run for office, take leadership roles, and become effective policymakers. Her call for political reforms was a call to dismantle the barriers that have traditionally hindered women's involvement in governance and to build a future where women's leadership is the norm rather than the exception.

She also made a passionate plea for the continued support and solidarity of both men and women in advocating for gender equality in politics. She underscored that gender equality is not a women's issue alone but a human rights issue that requires the collective effort of all sectors of society, from political leaders to civil society organizations, to ensure the full participation of women in all aspects of public life.

In her final remarks, Senator Kumari reaffirmed her commitment to the cause of women's empowerment and gender equality and called on all the participants to carry forward the momentum generated by the discussions at the roundtable. She urged them to continue their advocacy for women's rights, whether in the political sphere, the workplace, or in society at large. Senator Kumari's words were a powerful reminder that the fight for gender equality is ongoing, and that each person has a role to play in creating a world where women's voices are heard, respected, and valued in all areas of life.





Her concluding message was both inspiring and hopeful: "Together, we can dismantle the political and social structures that hold women back and build a future where women can equally share in the opportunities and responsibilities of political leadership and governance. Let's make the change we wish to see in the world."

Engaging Policymakers, Diplomats, **Interactive Session: Government Officials, and Civil Society**

The Interactive Session was a dynamic and engaging platform where a diverse group of experts and advocates, including members of parliament, diplomats, government officials, and civil society representatives, came together to share their insights and collaborate on the advancement of gender equality. This session served as the perfect conclusion to the day's discussions, allowing for deeper engagement and a collaborative approach to finding actionable solutions. Facilitated by Ms. Saadia Sabir, Program Manager at the United States Institute of Peace (USIP), the session created an open space for all participants to reflect on the key issues raised throughout the event and engage in meaningful dialogue.









Nighat Ahsan – Director of Communication and PR, Government of Pakistan

Nighat Ahsan, the Director of Communication and Public Relations for the Government of Pakistan, delivered emphasizing the pivotal compelling speech communication in addressing gender equality and elevating the visibility of women's issues in Pakistan. She began transformative highlighting the of media power communication in shaping societal perceptions, particularly in the way women's roles are viewed within society and policymaking frameworks.

Ms. Ahsan underscored the need for a comprehensive communication strategy that not only informs but also inspires societal change. She explained how both traditional media—including television, radio, and print—and digital platforms like social media and online forums have a significant influence on public opinion.

According to her, these mediums can either perpetuate outdated stereotypes or challenge norms by portraying women in roles of leadership, resilience, and innovation. She urged media professionals and stakeholders to be mindful of their responsibility in creating inclusive and empowering narratives.







Central to her speech was the assertion that government initiatives aimed at addressing gender disparities will only be successful if they are accompanied by well-designed communication strategies. Ms. Ahsan emphasized that effective communication ensures that both women and men are aware of their rights, the challenges they face, and the opportunities available for empowerment. She shared insights into how communication campaigns have proven successful in mobilizing communities to participate in national efforts for gender equality.

She highlighted examples of the Government of Pakistan's outreach programs and national campaigns, which are actively working to reshape societal attitudes.





These campaigns aim to promote women's education, economic participation, and political inclusion, showcasing women's achievements and breaking down barriers. She noted that programs such as Awareness Drives for Women's Legal Rights and Digital Literacy Initiatives for Women are supported by targeted media efforts to amplify their impact.

Ms. Ahsan also delved into the importance of inclusive storytelling. She advocated for more diverse representations of women in media, highlighting the need to go beyond urbancentric narratives to include the stories of rural women, women with disabilities, and women from marginalized communities. These stories, she argued, are essential for fostering a sense of shared purpose and inspiring collective action.

Concluding her address, Ms. Ahsan called for greater collaboration between the government, civil society, and media organizations to ensure that communication strategies are gender-sensitive and rooted in cultural contexts. She urged the media to act as a catalyst for change by aligning its narratives with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly those related to gender equality and women's

empowerment.





Her speech resonated with the audience, serving as a reminder that communication is not just a tool but a powerful force for social transformation. It can bridge gaps, challenge biases, and ultimately contribute to a more equitable society where women's rights are seen as human rights.

Uzma Yaqoob – Founder & Executive Director, Forum for Dignity Initiatives

Uzma Yaqoob delivered an insightful and passionate speech focusing on the critical intersection of gender-based violence (GBV) and economic empowerment, shedding light on the dual challenges women face in achieving independence and security. Her address was both a call to action and a roadmap for creating sustainable solutions to address these intertwined issues.





Ms. Yaqoob began by emphasizing the pervasive nature of gender-based violence and its far-reaching consequences, particularly on women's mental, emotional, and economic well-being. She described how GBV often creates a cycle of disempowerment, trapping women in poverty and highlighted the dependency, need for approaches to break this cycle. "Economic empowerment," she said, "is not just about financial independence—it's about giving women the confidence, tools, and autonomy to reclaim their lives and make decisions free from fear and coercion."

Drawing from her experience, Uzma detailed the challenges faced by women in rural and underserved areas, where cultural norms and systemic barriers often exacerbate their vulnerability.

She called for grassroots-level interventions that cater to the unique needs of these women, ensuring that solutions are localized, culturally relevant, and impactful. She shared examples of programs that have successfully provided women with skills training, microfinance opportunities, and entrepreneurial support, enabling them to create sustainable livelihoods.

Ms. Yaqoob stressed the importance of integrating economic empowerment initiatives with GBV support services. She proposed the establishment of comprehensive centers that offer women a safe space to receive vocational training, counseling, and legal aid under one roof. These centers, she argued, would serve as a lifeline for women seeking to escape abusive environments and build a secure future for themselves and their children.





Uzma also highlighted the role of community engagement in addressing GBV and promoting economic empowerment. She emphasized the need to involve men, religious leaders, and local influencers in changing mindsets and fostering an environment of support for women's rights. "Empowering women is not a women's issue alone," she stated. "It is a societal issue that requires the collective effort of everyone."

She further discussed the importance of government and policy-level interventions to support economic empowerment as a strategy to combat GBV. Uzma called for increased investment in women-focused programs, including subsidies for women-led businesses, access to markets, and streamlined processes for women to enter formal employment sectors. She urged policymakers to ensure that these programs reach the most marginalized women, bridging the gap between urban and rural areas.

A particularly powerful segment of her speech revolved around the role of education in economic empowerment. Uzma underscored that vocational training and digital literacy programs must be tailored to meet the specific needs of women survivors of GBV. She pointed out that such programs not only equip women with marketable skills but also serve as confidence-building tools that enable them to reintegrate into

society with dignity.





In her closing remarks, Uzma Yaqoob highlighted the importance of monitoring and evaluating empowerment initiatives to ensure their effectiveness and sustainability. She urged organizations and stakeholders to collaborate, share best practices, and scale successful models to reach more women. "Economic empowerment is a pathway to freedom and resilience," she said. "When we empower women, we are not just changing individual lives; we are transforming communities and shaping a future that is equitable and just."

Uzma's speech was met with widespread acclaim from the audience, resonating with participants from diverse sectors. Her message reinforced the urgent need for integrated approaches that address both the economic and social dimensions of gender-based violence, paving the way for women to lead lives free from oppression and full of opportunities.

Barira Hanif - Gender Specialist, Ministry of Planning, **Development, and Special Initiatives, Pakistan**

Barira Hanif delivered an insightful and thought-provoking presentation on the Government of Pakistan's gender strategies, showcasing the efforts being made to address women's issues at the national level. As a representative of the Ministry of Planning and Development, Ms. Hanif provided a comprehensive overview of the initiatives aimed at fostering gender equality through inclusive policies and gender-responsive budgeting.





Ms. Hanif began by outlining the government's commitment to integrating gender considerations into all aspects of national development plans. She explained how the Ministry is working to ensure that women are not only beneficiaries but also active contributors to Pakistan's socio-economic progress. "A gender-equal Pakistan is critical for the realization of our Development Goals (SDGs)," she asserted, Sustainable emphasizing that economic and political participation of women plays a pivotal role in achieving targets related to poverty reduction, education, and economic growth.

Highlighting the importance of gender-responsive budgeting, Ms. Hanif elaborated on how the government is allocating resources to initiatives that directly address women's needs. She cited specific programs focusing on women's health, education, entrepreneurship, and violence prevention, that financial investments ensuring are targeted impactful. These measures, she noted, are designed to close the gender gap and create a more equitable society.

A key point in Ms. Hanif's presentation was the emphasis on data-driven policies. She explained that the Ministry is increasingly relying on comprehensive data collection and analysis to measure the effectiveness of interventions aimed at advancing women's rights and access to opportunities.







"Without reliable data," she noted, "we cannot fully understand the challenges faced by women, nor can we evaluate the progress of our policies." She shared examples of successful data-driven initiatives, such as surveys and studies that inform targeted strategies to address issues like employment disparities, maternal health, and genderbased violence.

Ms. Hanif also addressed the need to foster women's economic empowerment, highlighting ongoing efforts to increase women's participation in the workforce through skill development programs, microfinance opportunities, and support for women-led businesses. She pointed out that empowering women economically has a ripple effect, benefiting families and communities while contributing to national growth.





On the topic of political participation, she emphasized the necessity of creating pathways for women to engage in decision-making processes. Ms. Hanif discussed the importance of legislative reforms and capacity-building initiatives that enable women to take leadership roles in both local and national governance. She commended the steps taken to increase women's representation in Parliament and local bodies, while also calling for further efforts to ensure their voices are heard.

Ms. Hanif concluded her address with a call for collaboration across sectors to advance gender equality. She stressed that achieving meaningful change requires the combined efforts of government agencies, civil society, private sector stakeholders, and international organizations. She urged all participants to actively contribute to creating a society where women can realize their full potential, free from discrimination inequality.

Sameena Nazir, Executive Director of PODA

Nazir, Executive Director of Sameena the Pakistan for Democracy and (PODA), Organization Awareness endorsed COPAIR's efforts for organizing the roundtable on December 10th, coinciding with Human Rights Day. Her presence at the event underscored the intersection of women's rights, human rights, and democratic participation.

In her address, Ms. Nazir provided an overview of PODA, a women's rights NGO that works tirelessly to promote and protect human rights, especially in rural areas of Pakistan. She highlighted the organization's core activities, which include conducting evidence-based research, executing rights-based programming, and engaging in advocacy aimed at fostering a cohesive and democratic society.







PODA's programs focus on a variety of issues, such as climate change education, women's rights advocacy, and constitutional rights education. Ms. Nazir stressed that these initiatives are critical for advancing rural communities' knowledge about their rights and equipping them to claim and exercise those rights. She particularly emphasized PODA's mission to empower rural women, youth, and minorities by providing access to education, livelihood skills, legal literacy, and human rights advocacy. These tools, she stated, were vital for helping these communities secure their National Identity Cards (CNICs) and achieve voter registration, laying the foundation for active political participation.

Ms. Nazir concluded by highlighting the importance empowering women to actively engage in political processes, as this would not only strengthen their community involvement but also ensure their voices were heard in decision-making spheres, contributing to a more inclusive and democratic society.

Shaukat Mukadam- Ex- Ambassador of Pakistan

Ambassador Shaukat Mukadam, while reminiscing about her daughter Noor Mukadam, delivered a deeply emotional and impactful speech on the importance of implementing existing legislation to protect women and ensure justice for victims of violence. She shared her personal tragedy to highlight the urgent need for comprehensive legal reforms and stronger enforcement to protect women from violence.





Ambassador Mukadam stressed the importance of holding perpetrators of violence accountable by advocating for harsh punishments, including capital punishment for those who commit heinous acts against women. He emphasized that justice must not only be pursued through legal channels but must also be ensured through stringent implementation of laws that provide meaningful protection for women.



Furthermore, Ambassador Mukadam spoke passionately about the role of economic empowerment in providing women with the ability to break free from cycles of abuse. She argued that financial independence is crucial for women to escape toxic and abusive relationships, make informed decisions about their lives, and contribute positively to their communities and society at large. He called for initiatives that ensure women have access to financial resources and opportunities, which would allow them to regain control over their futures.





His speech was a powerful reminder of the intersection of legal, economic, and social empowerment and underscored the need for a comprehensive approach to addressing gender-based violence. Ambassador Mukadam's call to action highlighted the collective responsibility of society, government, and institutions to ensure that women not only survive but thrive in a world where justice and equality are non-negotiable.

Shabana Arif- National Commission on the Status of Women

Shabana Arif, representing the National Commission on the Status of Women, delivered a thought-provoking speech on the constitutional guarantees for women's rights in Pakistan. She emphasized that the Constitution of Pakistan already provides solutions to many issues surrounding gender inequality by guaranteeing fundamental rights protections for women. However, she pointed out that the challenge lies in translating these constitutional provisions into tangible actions that ensure women's rights are not only acknowledged but actively respected and fully implemented across all sectors of society.

Ms. Arif highlighted the significant strides Pakistan has made in creating pro-women legislation, noting the passage of numerous laws aimed at protecting women's rights.





Yet, despite these strong legal frameworks, she noted a persistent gap between what is written in the Constitution and the real-world enforcement of these laws. This gap, she argued, remains a major barrier to achieving full gender equality in Pakistan.

She called for greater efforts in bridging this divide through accountability, effective implementation, and the commitment of all stakeholders—government, civil society, and the public—to ensure that women's rights are not just theoretical but realized in practice.

In her closing remarks, Shabana stressed the importance of collaboration between legislative bodies, enforcement agencies, and the public to create an environment where women can fully benefit from the legal protections they are promised by the Constitution.






Shabana's speech underscored the need for not only enacting laws but also ensuring that these laws are translated into effective actions that tangibly improve the lives of women across Pakistan.

Mahnoor Quraishi - Broadcast Journalist

Mahnoor Quraishi, a Broadcast Journalist, delivered a thought-provoking speech emphasizing the critical importance of emotional independence for women. While much focus is often placed on financial empowerment, she pointed out the significant gap in addressing women's emotional well-being. She stressed that emotional resilience and stability are essential for women to navigate life's challenges and make confident decisions.





Mahnoor highlighted that the societal focus on economic independence should not overshadow the need for emotional support systems for women. She emphasized that fostering emotional independence empowers women to take control of their lives, pursue their goals with confidence, and overcome the obstacles they face. This, she argued, is a necessary component for holistic empowerment that enables women to live fulfilling and autonomous lives.

Her speech called for a shift in the discourse around women's empowerment, advocating for a more inclusive approach that addresses both emotional and financial independence, ensuring that women are equipped with the tools they need to succeed not just economically, but also emotionally.








Vote of Thanks by Ms. Amna Munawwar Awan

Challenges

The conference highlighted several key challenges that persist in the journey toward achieving gender equality and women's empowerment:

Societal Hurdles: Persistent societal and structural barriers, such as deeply ingrained gender biases, continue to limit opportunities for marginalized communities, especially women, in Pakistan. These barriers prevent women from accessing essential services, education, and economic opportunities.

Gender Disparities: Cultural norms and societal expectations in male-dominated restrict world women's access to in various fields, such opportunities as sports, entrepreneurship, and small businesses. These disparities are often compounded by traditional gender roles that prioritize male involvement in decision-making and leadership.

Mental Health Neglect: Women's mental health underprioritized in Pakistan, with limited resources, support systems, and awareness to address mental health challenges, further hindering their overall well-being and potential for personal and professional growth.

Cultural and Societal Barriers: Deep-rooted cultural norms and gender biases significantly hinder women's participation in key areas such as education, politics, and the workforce, especially in rural and marginalized communities. These barriers reinforce inequality and limit women's social mobility.



Economic Inequities: Women face restricted access to finance, entrepreneurial opportunities, and formal employment, perpetuating cycles of poverty and dependence. Economic empowerment remains a major challenge due to systemic barriers to resources, capital, and training.

Underrepresentation in Leadership: Women are vastly underrepresented in leadership and decision-making roles across both public and private sectors. This lack of representation prevents women from shaping policies that directly impact their lives and communities, stifling systemic change.

Lack of Gender-Sensitive Policies: Despite some progress, gender-responsive policies are not adequately integrated into national and local development frameworks. The gap between policy formulation and effective implementation continues to hinder progress on gender equality.

Limited Education and Skill Development: Limited access to quality education and skills training—especially in digital and technical fields—creates a significant gender divide. This lack of access prevents women from participating in high-demand sectors, exacerbating existing inequalities.

Gender-Based Violence: High rates of violence against women, combined with weak legal protections and inadequate support systems, create a pervasive barrier to women's empowerment. Gender-based violence remains a significant social issue, undermining women's security and freedom.




Disaster Vulnerability: Women and children are disproportionately affected by natural disasters. Gender-insensitive disaster management practices often overlook the specific needs of women, especially in displaced communities, leaving them more vulnerable during crises.

Lack of Legal Protections: Insufficient legal safeguards and gaps in law enforcement make it difficult for women to challenge discrimination, exploitation, and violence. Even with legislation in place, weak enforcement mechanisms prevent women from accessing justice.

Male Dominance in Decision-Making: Decision-making forums, both in governance and the private sector, remain overwhelmingly male-dominated, excluding women's voices. This lack of representation results in policies that fail to address women's specific needs and perpetuate gender inequality.

Gender-Neutral Development Budgets: Prior to the implementation of the National Gender Framework, development budgets lacked a gender-sensitive approach, further entrenching systemic inequalities. There is a need for gender-responsive budgeting to ensure that resources are allocated equitably to address women's needs.









Early Marriages and Gender-Based Violence: Early marriages contribute significantly to gender-based violence and limit women's access to education and economic opportunities. This practice perpetuates cycles of poverty and dependence, especially in rural areas.

Cross-Cutting Gender Issues: Gender inequality is a pervasive issue that crosses multiple sectors—affecting women's lives in social, economic, and political spheres. A comprehensive and integrated approach is required to tackle gender inequality at all levels of society.

Underrepresentation of Women in Law Enforcement: Women remain severely underrepresented in law enforcement, with only 3% of the police force being female. This disparity limits the ability to effectively address gender-based violence and offer a more responsive and empathetic approach to survivors of violence.

Challenges for Non-Binary Individuals: Non-binary individuals face exclusion, discrimination, and violence in both social and institutional contexts, making it difficult for them to access basic rights, support, and opportunities.











Lack of Rehabilitation for Rural Women: Women in rural areas face numerous barriers to empowerment, including limited access to education, healthcare, and economic opportunities. Without comprehensive rehabilitation and support programs, many remain trapped in poverty, unable to break free from cycles of dependence.

Gap Between Government and Civil Society: There remains a significant disconnect between government agencies and civil society organizations, resulting in fragmented efforts and limited collaboration. This gap restricts the effectiveness of initiatives aimed at advancing gender equality.

Financial Barriers for Women in Balochistan: In areas like Balochistan, financial barriers—such as the absence of ATMs or personal bank accounts for women-limit their economic independence and autonomy. Women often rely on male family members for financial access, constraining decision-making power.









Recommendations

Based on the discussions during the conference, the following recommendations were proposed to address these challenges:

Promote Gender-Inclusive Education: girls' Increase enrollment and retention in schools, especially in underserved areas, by introducing targeted scholarships and mentorship programs. Focus on encouraging women's participation in STEM and digital skills training to bridge gender gaps in these fields.

Economic Opportunities: Expand Enhance access to microfinance, vocational training, and entrepreneurial support for women. Collaborate with both the government and private sector to foster gender-inclusive workplaces and provide women-led businesses with necessary resources and opportunities.

Ensure Representation in Leadership: Implement quotas and mechanisms to boost women's representation leadership positions political, across corporate, community sectors. Develop capacity-building programs to prepare women for leadership roles and decision-making positions.





Strengthen Gender-Responsive Policies: Ensure gender considerations are integrated into policy planning, budgeting, and implementation at all levels. Establish robust monitoring and evaluation frameworks to assess the impact of these policies and ensure their effectiveness.

Combat Gender-Based Violence: Enhance legal protections and improve enforcement mechanisms to address gender-based violence effectively. Provide accessible support services such as counseling, legal aid, and safe spaces for survivors, while ensuring swift justice through time-bound court cases.

Develop Gender-Sensitive Disaster Management: Incorporate women's voices and leadership in disaster planning and response. Ensure disaster relief measures are designed to meet the unique needs of women and girls, providing equal access to resources and support.

Foster Public Awareness: Launch national campaigns to challenge harmful gender norms and raise awareness about women's rights. Promote gender equality as a societal value, while leveraging media to share empowering stories and challenge stereotypes.





Leverage Technology for Empowerment: Develop digital platforms and tools tailored to women's needs, like COPAIR's chatbot initiative, to offer support and resources. Encourage technological innovation to address issues of safety. healthcare, and financial empowerment for women.

Increase Access to Education: Ensure that education remains a priority for women and girls by investing in accessible, quality education. Encourage women's participation in STEM fields, entrepreneurship, and leadership training to ensure they are equipped for success in an evolving world.

Promote Inclusivity in Governance: Strengthen policies and frameworks that ensure the active participation of women in political and decision-making processes. Encourage women's representation and involvement in local, provincial, and national governance.

Prioritize Girls in Development Plans: Ensure that development programs and policies specifically address the needs of girls, particularly in education, healthcare, and skill development, laying a foundation for lifelong empowerment.

Enhance Civic Sense and Cultural Exposure: Integrate civic sense through arts, culture, and sports into education and community initiatives to help women gain confidence and break societal barriers.





Support Women's Mental Health: Develop accessible mental health programs and support systems for women, addressing the personal and societal pressures they face. Provide counseling, wellness resources, and peer support networks.

Promote Equal Opportunities in All Sectors: Provide equal access for women to opportunities in sports, entrepreneurship, and small business development through targeted funding, training, and mentorship programs.

Strengthen Legal Protections and Enforcement: Implement and enforce laws that safeguard women's rights, particularly in cases of gender-based discrimination and violence. Strengthen the legal system to ensure accountability and justice for women.

Engage Local NGOs and Partners: Collaborate with local organizations to design culturally sensitive and contextually appropriate strategies. These partnerships can help ensure the success of gender-equality initiatives while respecting local traditions.

Craft Culturally Relevant Campaigns: Develop campaigns and initiatives that resonate with local values and traditions. Promote progressive ideals by aligning messages with cultural sensitivities, creating a balance between respect for heritage and the need for change.





Delay Marriage Age: Advocate for raising the minimum marriage age by at least two years to improve economic and social outcomes for women and positively impact population dynamics.

Target Adolescents for Empowerment: Focus on empowering girls during adolescence by providing them with the education, resources, and support needed to navigate societal barriers and unlock their full potential.

Reduce Gender Disparity in Law Enforcement: Implement a 10% female police officer quota to address the gender gap in law enforcement. This would improve responses to gender-based violence and ensure greater support for female survivors.

Implement Flexible Working Hours: Introduce flexible working hours for female law enforcement officers to help them balance their professional and personal responsibilities. This policy would enhance female participation in the force and improve responses to gender-based violence.

Revise Legislation to Include Young People (18-24): Update laws to include young people in the legislative process. This demographic plays a crucial role in shaping the country's future, and their voices should be integrated into policies related to education, employment, and social welfare.





Capitalize on the Youth Bulge: Provide young people with educational, employment, and targeted opportunities. Harnessing the potential of Pakistan's growing youth population can drive national development and foster economic growth.

Use Media for Women's Empowerment and Awareness: Leverage both traditional and digital media platforms to raise awareness about women's rights, share empowering stories, and challenge societal gender norms. Use media to highlight the benefits of gender equality.

Build on Existing Research and Data: Rather than repeating existing gender data, build on preexisting research to develop actionable solutions. Leverage this data to inform initiatives and improve the effectiveness of ongoing efforts to close gender gaps.

Focus on Economic Development for Women: Prioritize economic empowerment initiatives that provide women with access to jobs, entrepreneurship, and financial independence. These policies should be inclusive and supportive of women's participation in the workforce.

Establish Skill Centers for Women: Set up vocational training centers that offer marketable skills for women, especially those from marginalized communities. These centers should be accessible and designed to meet the unique needs of women.





Improve Trainer Quality: Ensure trainers in skill centers are well-trained and equipped to deliver high-quality instruction. Competent trainers are essential to the success of these programs and can significantly impact the skills development of women.

Utilize the Full Potential of Women: Promote women's participation across all sectors of society, particularly in leadership, decision-making, and economic activities. Empower women through education, employment, and community engagement to drive national development.

Strengthen Existing Laws for Women's Rights: Fully implement and strengthen laws that protect women from discrimination and violence. Adapt these laws to address emerging challenges and ensure they remain effective in advancing gender equality.

Time-Frame Court Cases Related to Women's Rights: Establish clear timelines for resolving court cases related to women's rights and gender-based violence. Time-bound procedures would ensure swift justice and enhance the efficiency of the legal system.

Micro-financing for Rural Women: Use micro-financing as a transformative tool to empower rural women by providing them with small loans and financial support to start businesses, gain financial independence, and improve their quality of life.

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
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
